Dear friends in Ceresco Baptist Church,

"You really practice that!" It was 1955 and as my Dad told it, he had just washed his hands, a courtesy his skeptical dinner host, a Congolese school director, had not offered. Back then, teaching good hygiene went along with preaching the gospel because God's precepts of purity and cleanliness, introduced millennia ago, were unknown by large swaths of the world population. The COVID 19 pandemic highlights how much these practices have evolved in Congo.

Hand washing requires water that in rural Congo is often carried on the heads of children many miles, uphill. As hand washing became accepted, folks used a common basin to wash before meals. On our return to Congo in 2004, I was impressed on several trips into the heartland to be presented before meals with a basin of water, soap, and towel. I felt that the battle to change behavior in favor of better routine hygiene had been won. However, there were often up to a dozen folks being served and for the last in line, the water and towel were pretty grimy.

Sanru, the group I worked with at the time, introduced the concept of falling water for hand washing, similar to water from a faucet. This required going 'high tech' and suspending a container to pour water. There were LOTS of variations on the theme. One involved a can with a hole that one had to rush to use before the water ran out. Others suspended a jug that could be tipped to produce water as needed. All of these were a significant improvement over the 'common basin' because they used less water, and it was clean for every user.

Over the ensuing decades the idea caught on. Someone introduced a pail with a faucet for hand washing. Soon a market developed for home hand washing stations comprising a welded frame to hold a bucket, soap, and a basin to catch the used water. This is appropriate because indoor plumbing is still unavailable for 90% of urban households in Congo cities.

With the Covid 19 pandemic, diligent hand washing is crucial. Hospitals in the Baptist network have begun to receive patients with COVID symptoms, but most rural hospitals don't have plumbed-in water. To slow infection spread, hand washing stations are need at multiple strategic locations. A hand washing station and gallon of liquid soap cost about \$45. Katherine used White Cross and other funds to purchase several dozen hand washing stations and sent them to Baptist hospitals, along with soap, hand sanitizer, bleach, masks, and gloves.

How grateful we are again for the network of supporters God has gathered around us through International Ministries, and the generosity you share with us, even amidst your own suffering and hardship. As you pray for us, be assured we thank God for you, and pray for you.

It Is Well with my Soul

The story behind the writing of It Is Well with my Soul.

The author, Horatio Spafford, born October 22, 1828 in Troy, New York, grew up to become a successful lawyer in Chicago. He wrote the words to It Is Well with my Soul after receiving the tragic news of the death of his four daughters.

On the fateful night of November 22, 1873, the Ville de Havre, a passenger ship, sank in a midocean collision. Out of his entire family, only his wife survived. The rest of the story would take me all the way to Jerusalem.


During February of 1997, my wife, Linda, two Christian friends, and I boarded a plane in New York City for the Holy Land. During our ten day stay, I was able to visit the American Colony Hotel and the Children's Hospital—both establishments founded by our author, Horatio Spafford. To add more intrigue to the story, I met the last living member of the Spafford family. It was there in the lobby of the American Colony, I found the chilling details of that horrible voyage plus the explanation of how a descendant of Spafford has always owned the hotel even though all his children had died in that horrible accident.

Back in 1873, Horatio had decided to take his family to France and then on to Switzerland. That's why passage had been booked on the French liner, S. S. Ville de Havre. Because of last minute business, Horatio planned to stay behind a few weeks, then catch up with his family. Having gone to New York and after boarding the ship, an uneasy feeling caused him to have the family's cabins changed to the bow of the ship.

It would be just a few days later, at two in the morning, that the ship would be cut in two right at the cabins the Spaffords had left. In less than twelve minutes, the children succumbed to the rushing water, but Anna survived. If the changing of cabins hadn't happened, she too would have died. Had Anna died, history would have taken a different course because it was when Spafford was in route to reunite with his wife, after the accident, that he penned the words to the song.

When finally back in Chicago, they would eventually have three more children: a boy, Horatio Jr., who died of scarlet fever at the age of four, and two girls, Bertha and Grace. Both of the girls would eventually travel to Jerusalem with their parents—starting the legacy of American Colony ownership and the beginning of the hospital.

The shipwreck of the Ville de Havre would remain one of the unexplained tragedies of the sea and its greatest disaster up until the sinking of Titanic. For many of us, when troubles come our way, it is hard to understand why. If only we too could say, "When sorrows like sea billows roll, it is well, it is well with my soul." I believe, with Christ Jesus, we can. Horatio Spafford did.


